Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates an understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements. For example, she knows the local safeguarding reporting procedures to follow if she has a concern about a child's welfare.
- The childminder has suitable knowledge of how to promote children's learning. She explains how she will plan suitable challenging and enjoyable activities to help support their individual needs and interests, and help them make good progress.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's health and physical exercise. For example, she explains the importance of ensuring children have daily opportunities to be physically active outside.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents, other early years settings and schools to help support continuity in children's care and learning.
- The childminder has a positive attitude towards promoting the diversity of cultures. For example, she understands the importance of encouraging parents and children to share key words in their home languages to promote and value their family backgrounds and experiences.
- The childminder understands the importance of self-evaluation. She has taken steps to improve her practice since the last inspection.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder her knowledge and understanding of the safeguarding and learning and development requirements.
- The inspector looked at the areas of the premises where childcare is to be provided.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children and undertake observation, assessment and planning.
- The inspector checked evidence of the suitability of the childminder and adults living on the premises. She discussed the childminder's understanding of self-evaluation.
- The inspector looked at policies and documents the childminder will use when caring for children.
