Summary of key findings for parents

This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder knows the procedures to follow if she has concerns regarding a child's welfare. She understands how to help children learn to keep themselves safe.
- The childminder continues to develop her knowledge to help her improve outcomes for children. For example, she completes relevant training courses.
- The childminder is aware of how to help children prepare for the move to school. She knows how to use observations to assess their learning and to make plans that support children's development and progress.
- The childminder understands the value of working in partnership with parents and other settings children attend, to support consistency of care and promote learning.
- The childminder recognises the importance of a healthy lifestyle. For example, she knows to encourage children to enjoy daily fresh air and exercise, such as in the garden or on walks in the local area.
- The childminder does not have valid public liability insurance, as required.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further
