Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has attended a relevant child protection training course and has a secure understanding of how to safeguard children. She has an effective safeguarding policy in place, and keeps up to date with current guidelines about how to protect children from harm.
- The childminder provides a suitable range of resources and activities which is appropriate for children of different ages and stages of development. She understands the importance of helping children to settle and feel secure.
- The childminder understands how observations and assessments can be used to plan appropriate experiences to meet children's individual learning and development requirements.
- The childminder is committed to undertaking further training and recognises how she can evaluate her practice, in order to identify where she can make improvements.
- The childminder demonstrates how she will work in close partnership with parents and other settings that children attend. She is clear on the procedures she will follow to share detailed information to complement children's welfare and development.
- The childminder understands how to promote and celebrate diversity, including how to help children learn to respect one another and the wider community.
- The childminder understands how to promote healthy lifestyles. She intends to provide food and drinks that meet children's individual dietary requirements. She is clear about how she will support children's physical well-being, such as through daily exercise and visits to local parks.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

- The inspector viewed the resources and activities available for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intended to deliver the educational programmes for children.

The childminder was registered in 2012 and lives in Birmingham. She operates all year round from 6.30am to 7.30pm, Monday to Friday, except bank holidays and family holidays. The childminder has an early years qualification at level 3.
