Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to use observation and assessments to monitor children's learning and help them to make progress. She understands how to plan and provide appropriate learning experiences that help children in their next stage in learning.
- The childminder is aware of self-evaluation processes to help her to identify and make changes to her practice. She attends training to increase her professional knowledge and skills.
- The childminder understands her role and responsibilities to safeguard children. For example, she attends regular safeguarding training and knows what to do if she has any concerns about a child's welfare.
- The childminder understands how to promote healthy lifestyles. For example, she knows how to teach children about healthy eating and plans to provide daily opportunities for fresh air and exercise.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnerships with parents and other professionals involved in children's care, to promote continuity in their learning and development.
- The childminder knows how to promote children's positive behaviour, so they learn to be confident and respect others.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder her understanding of the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver educational programmes for children and undertake observation, planning and assessment.
- The inspector viewed the areas and resources that will be used by the children.
- The inspector looked at documentation, including the childminder's policies and procedures.

The childminder registered in 2012. She lives in the Abbey Wood area of the London Borough of Bexley. The childminder operates for most of the year. There were no children in the early years age group on roll at the time of the inspection.
