Summary of key findings

This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not hold a current paediatric first-aid certificate. This means that she does not have up-to-date knowledge of how to care for children should minor accidents occur.
- The childminder understands the importance of getting to know children and building relationships with them, helping them to feel happy in her home. She discusses supporting children's behaviour and assisting them to appreciate and respect the safety rules of her home and the needs of others.
- The childminder has processes for assessing and reducing risks to the children in her home and on outings, to help ensure their safety. She has public liability insurance and a range of policies to support her practice. She knows the procedures to follow if she has any concerns about children's welfare.
- The childminder understands how to contribute to children's good health. She discusses providing children with nutritious meals and regular physical experiences outdoors. The childminder plans to teach children about the world around them through opportunities to explore nature and visits to interesting venues in the local community, exploring different cultures.
- The childminder discusses building on what children already know to develop their skills further, planning activities around what they need to learn next. She has plans for setting out her home with resources to support different areas of learning as well as the varying ages and interests of the children. She understands the importance of sharing information regularly with parents, to help provide a consistent approach for children's care and development.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:
