Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a clear understanding of safeguarding procedures, to promote the safety of any child she may care for.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's development in all areas of learning. She knows how to observe children's play and to plan for their next steps, and what assessments must be undertaken.
- The childminder has an understanding of improving children's learning experiences. For example, she has taken appropriate steps since the previous inspection to offer children more challenges in their learning and aid their independence skills further.
- The childminder understands the importance of involving parents in their children's development, and engages them to provide regular feedback on the service provided.
- The childminder has an understanding of promoting children's health and well-being. She understands the importance of children having daily opportunities to be physically active outdoors and eat healthily.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed the safeguarding and welfare requirements with the childminder.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to observe, assess and plan for children's learning and development.
- The inspector discussed the professional development of the childminder since her previous inspection, and steps taken to address previous recommendations.
- The inspector looked at a range of documentation relating to training, suitability, parental feedback, and policies and procedures shared with parents.
- The inspector carried out a tour of the premises with the childminder and looked at a range of play materials.
