Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has started to evaluate her provision but has not identified her failure to meet all requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and Childcare Register.
- The childminder does not keep a record of children's hours of attendance, as required.
- The childminder does not know the type of changes or events that must be notified to Ofsted.
- The childminder does not have sufficient knowledge and understanding of the learning and development requirements. She does not assess children's progress, including completing the required progress check for two-year-olds. Activities are not planned effectively to build on what children already know and can do.
- The childminder has an adequate understanding of her safeguarding responsibilities. She knows what to do if she has concerns about a child's welfare. She uses risk assessment effectively to create a safe play environment and meets ratio requirements.
- The childminder provides healthy and nutritious food for children.
- The childminder understands the importance of teaching children to respect one another and to behave well.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:

The childminder registered in 2014. She lives in Brooklands, Milton Keynes. The childminder offers care Monday to Friday, 7.30am until 6pm, for most of the year. There were no children present at the time of the inspection.
