The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection This home was judged good at the last full inspection. At this interim inspection, the home was not judged. The reason for not making a judgement at this inspection visit is that the home is currently closed. A total refurbishment and reconfiguration of the physical environment will commence shortly. The local authority, in its role of registered provider, has indicated to Ofsted that it will not provide short breaks from this home for approximately eight months from the date of inspection. When the local authority decides that the home is ready to start providing short breaks, the registered persons are required to inform Ofsted of their intention before they do so. They must tell us three months in advance of their intention to recommence a short-breaks service for any child or young person at this children's home. While this home is closed, the local authority will continue to provide a short-breaks service from a different site in the borough. These different premises have been registered with Ofsted as a children's home and with the Care Quality Commission as a care home for adults. This newly registered service is subject to regular inspection and regulatory activities.	

Information about this children's home

This is a local authority service. It provides short breaks for up to five children who have complex learning and/or physical disabilities and challenging behaviours. Children usually stay from Monday to Friday or at weekends. The children's respite service shares the building and the garden with a similar service for adults. Locked doors separate these two services. There is one registered manager for both children's and adults' services. All staff also work across both provisions. The Care Quality Commission regulates and inspects the adult service.

Inspectors have looked closely at the experiences and progress of children and young people living in the children's home. They read case files, watched how professional staff work with children, young people and each other and discussed the effectiveness of help and care given to children and young people. Wherever possible, they talked to children, young people and their families. In addition the inspectors have tried to understand what the children's home knows about how well it is performing, how well it is doing and what difference it is making for the children and young people who it is trying to help, protect and look after.

This inspection focused on the effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection.

This inspection was carried out under the Care Standards Act 2000 to assess the effectiveness of the service and to consider how well it complies with the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015 and the 'Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards'.

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
